

LOG CABIN LORE

Log Cabins are the topic of our December/January Art Gallery Exhibit. It's a cozy display that makes you want to just sit and bask in the warmth.


We have 10 log cabin quilts on the walls. Most of the ones belonging to the museum date back to 1890. The newest one was pieced by Doll Nielsen this year. Doll has loaned us several of her quilts for this show. It's fascinating to see how the same basic blocks can be arranged to make such diverse designs.

The exhibit features our actual log cabin. Built of cottonwood logs on a Nebraska homestead in 1864, the cabin was dismantled and reconstructed on our campus in 1976. If it's warm enough you can go out and tour it, or you can look at our scrapbook for its story.

There's also a spot to build a log cabin – out of Lincoln Logs. Invented in 1916, Lincoln Logs have been a part of childhood for generations. We give you a chance to sit and play for a while. It could be a good way to teach your grandchild how the pioneers notched logs and interlocked walls.

The show includes 4 Christmas trees and a crackling fireplace to ward off the chill.

Come in and sit a spell. Don't miss this exhibit! It will be in our Art Gallery through January.
